I want to start this letter to the 3rd District by thanking Jenni for reminding me to get something into the Informer. Sadly, Jenni must remind me all the time.

I want to write about the message I want to get out to the 3rd District. These are four things I believe will help make a Post a good Post. They are:

- Communication-Is there good communication within your Post. If you have 60 members in your Post and only 15 show up for the meeting, how do you communicate with the other 45 Members on what you meeting was about or what you are planning. We need to find ways to make sure all your members know what the Post is doing. Communication should not be just once a year contact for Membership. Buddy Checks would be a good start to communicating with your Membership. This communication should extend to the Legion Family within your Post too.
- 2. **Involvement**-How many times have you heard within your Post "It is always the same Members doing all the work." It could be that the 45 members who didn't attend the meeting didn't know of the event that you needed help with. Don't sit back and wait for members to get involved, call them and tell them about the event and the help you need and what you are doing it for.
- 3. Visibility-Is your Post Visible in your community? When hosting an event are you wearing Legion gear (Legion Caps, Legion Baseball Caps, shirts, etc) to show the community you are The American Legion and you are Post XYZ. Does your Post have signs signifying your Post is sponsoring this event. When you go to Memorial Day, Veterans Day or events, are you wearing Legion gear? Your community needs to know that you are two things. 1. A Veteran and 2. You are an American Legion Member who is still serving his fellow Veterans and their Community. THE THIRD DISTRICT HAS SIGNS THAT WE LEND OUT FOR EVENTS. Contact Dept. Vice Commander Jerry Hook if you would like to use these.
- 4. Accountability-Your Post and your Post alone are accountable for how it operates. Each Post should ask itself if it is having Good Meetings. Are you following the Admin. Manual to know when our programs (Scholarships, Oratorical, Of the Year Awards, WALLECA, A&G Testing, etc.). Does your Post turn in the proper paperwork on time. Consolidated Post Reports, Post Officer Reports, Post Data Reports? This is all Accountability.

How do we make these things happen in your Post. Be Positive, be Relevant and Be The One to make the difference in your Post. It takes just one or two members to turn things around. Let it begin with you.

Warm February Greetings Third District,

"Last four?" "What's your last four?" A question that is asked of veterans receiving care at the William S. Middleton Veterans Memorial Hospital in Madison; the answer to "What's your last four?" is the veteran's last four numbers of their social security number.

I first met "T" while he was an in-patient at the VA and I was a volunteer visiting the in-patients pushing the activity cart going from room to room saying "Hello, I'm with the American Legion Auxiliary, would you like a visit, I have plenty items on the activity cart you might like. "T" wasn't interested in any of the items but would like a visit, as he was from out of state and didn't receive many visitors. "T"s request was just a visit, a chance to converse with someone besides the staff. So, for the next six weeks I would visit "T"and after a while he asked me one day if he could tell me of his time in Vietnam, as his wife didn't want to listen to his memories. Each Tuesday morning, I would listen as "T" spoke of the rural villages, the women and children, the constant heat, humidity or the endless rain, the constant "being on guard" for the enemy, the Black Mountain, and finally of the close brotherhood of soldiers looking out for each other, the brotherhood he still missed. After "T" spoke of his experiences, he spoke of the guilt he felt, his sorrow, remorse and of his depression. T. hoped that God would forgive him for all his wrong doings; I reassured "T" that God had indeed forgiven him. On my last visit, "T" greeted me with a smile on his face and his spirits lifted as he showed me the valentines he received from Auxiliary members. As I left his room pushing the activity cart down the hall, I thought to myself, "T" you are so much more than your last four."

1964-1975 For us it was the six o'clock news, For them it was reality. We called for pizza, They called for medics. We watched the children, They watched children die. We learned of life. They learned of death. We served dinner, They served their country. Our passion was success, Theirs was survival. We forgot, They can't. -Author Unknown

Over the years many ALA members hand wrote personal messages inside valentines to be distributed to the veterans at various VA health care facilities. I'm sharing with you a response from a veteran that received a valentine upon entering the William S. Middelton Veterans Memorial Hospital. "Dear Auxiliary Unit 360 (Waunakee), for us veterans who are seniors, living alone and due to PTSD don't mingle. It is easy to feel lonely and blue over any holiday. I was feeling like that today when cards and flowers were seeming to be had by so many, but not me. On my way to a VA appointment, I passed the information desk where this card made its way into my hands and heart with the beautiful lily on the front. I got my flowers! With the caring message inside. I felt less alone in the world. I smiled all day and I'm still smiling. Thank you for remembering us. We appreciate you. I know I do!"

Third District Poppy Program news:

It is way too early to order and plant spring and summer flowers for our gardens; but the American Legion Auxiliary members before us planted the seeds of the Poppy Program with its beginning in 1920. The poppy is the official flower of the American Legion Family. The red color of the poppy symbolizes the blood shed of the soldiers during Worl War 1.

Each year the weekend before Memorial Day, members of the American Legion Auxiliary distribute poppies with the hope each person passing by the poppy display will donate and wear the poppy long after Memorial Day. All donations received go to the Auxiliary's programs that benefit/provide our nation's veterans, active and military families. 20 percent of the net profits of each Unit's are to be sent to the Department for the Department's Children & Youth and VA&R programs.
