Junior members along with young Sons of the American Legion can earn patches for activities. This year the Junior Committee will be highlighting activities and patches. Patches have activities designed for the age of the Junior to provide learning and involvement in the programs of the American Legion Auxiliary. Members from age 3 through grade 12 can earn patches in 15 programs.

Patch activities are divided by age groups with members from ages 3 through kindergarten earned PURPLE patches. Red patches are for members in Grades 1 through 4 and GOLD patches are for members in grades 5 through 8. Older Juniors in grades 9 through 12 earn patches with BLUE borders. Besides the 35 program patches there are special patches for events or activities.

One patch is for attending a Division Junior meeting so register for your meeting Juniors and receive a patch for attending. This year Junior members attending their Girl State program will receive a Junior patch.

DO NOT forget the CHILDREN OF WARRIORS NATIONAL PRESIDENTS' PATCH. This patch can be earned by any Junior or SAL youth if they raise at least \$5 for each year old. For example, a 17-year-old would raise a minimum of \$85 (17 x \$5 = \$85.) and send this in to ALA National to support this scholarship using the form created for this patch.

This month we are focusing on the National Security Patch from the ALA Patch Program. This National Security Patch is available for Juniors and Young SAL members to earn and focuses on Care Packages, Armed Services Food Pantries, POW/MIA Ceremonies, and support of military families. If your unit is near a military base there are many ways to

support active military and their families. You can assist in preparing care packages and send thinking of you cards to "any soldier." Reach out to the Family Readiness Group on base and ask what you can do. Not all units are located near military installations, but care packages and cards are welcome from anywhere and everywhere.

Check your community for food pantries, assistance is always needed at these locations. Junior Activities Chairs, teach you Juniors the meaning of the POW/MIA Ceremony and have your Juniors and/or SAL hold this ceremony at an upcoming Post/Unit meeting.

Junior Activities Chairs teaching and helping our Juniors and Young SAL members to become aware of the ALA Programs and the ALA's mission of service not self is of foremost importance. These are our young leaders, the awarding of these patches for their hard work helps to create a culture of pride of accomplishment.

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
