



"We the people" are the first 3 words of the Preamble in the US Constitution. They chose these words to signify the unity of the US, and that the power of the government was in the people's (as a whole) hands, not a singular person or government or even branch of government.

Pocket Flags

The Pocket Flag Project (pocketflagproject.com)

Started in October 2001, LuWanda Ford met with Boy Scout Leaders who were veterans of Vietname and Gulf Wars – carried small, folded flags in their left shirt pockets

Pocket flags are only for ACTIVE DUTY DEPLOYED or DEPLOYING TROOPS

Can also get flags from Emblem Sales

Item # 101.225 Pocket Flag (8" x 12") – has hemmed edge

Materials needed - Flag, enclosure card, and 3x3 bag

Folding the pocket flag





1. To fold the flag correctly, bring the striped half up over the blue field.



2. Then fold it in half again keeping the cut edges on top. Rotate the flag 90 degrees so you are working from the bottom up for the next steps.



3. Bring the lower striped corner to the upper edge, forming a triangle.

4. Then fold the upper point in to form another triangle. Continue until the entire length of the flag is folded.



5. When you get near the end—nothing but the blue field showing—tuck the last bit into the other folds to secure it using a Popsicle stick.



6. The final folded flag resembles a cocked hat with only the white stars on a blue field showing.

Recognizing the Signs of Stroke and Heart Attack

EARLY DETECTION SAVES LIVES

Why it Matters

- Every second counts. Quick recognition and response can save lives and prevent long-term damage.
- Stroke and heart attack are leading causes of death worldwide.
- Knowing the signs ensures faster medical intervention.



Signs of a Stroke (Remember F.A.S.T.)


F – Face Drooping: One side of the face may droop or feel numb. Ask the person to smile; is it uneven?

A – Arm Weakness: Sudden weakness or numbness in one arm. Ask the person to raise both arms; does one drift downward?

- S Speech Difficulty: Slurred or strange speech. Ask them to repeat a simple sentence; is it clear?
- T Time to Call 911: If you notice any of these signs, act immediately

Other Stroke Symptoms:

- Sudden confusion or trouble understanding.
- Vision issues in one or both eyes.
- Sudden, severe headache without a known cause.

Signs of a Heart Attack

Classic Symptoms:


- Chest pain or discomfort, often described as pressure, tightness, or a squeezing sensation.
- Pain spreading to the arms, back, neck, jaw, or stomach.

Other Symptoms:

- Shortness of breath, with or without chest discomfort.
- Cold sweat, nausea, or lightheadedness.
- Fatigue or unexplained exhaustion, especially in women.

What to Do in an Emergency



For Stroke:

• Call 911 immediately. Note the time symptoms started.

For Heart Attack:

- Call 911 without delay.
 If available, chew and
- If available, chew and swallow aspirin (if not allergic).
- Stay calm and help the person remain seated or lying down

What To Take Away

- Learn the signs. Act fast.
- Early action saves lives and minimizes damage.
- Be proactive about your health and encourage others to do the same.
- Be encouraged to share this knowledge with others to create a safer community.
